

BLUEMONT / BON AIR

Unified by long-standing civic pride and a central geographic location, the Bluemont/Bon Air neighborhood boasts an unrivaled network of trails, no fewer than six parks, a thriving retail core, and myriad transportation options. From the days of Ball's Crossroads to the heyday of the W&OD Railroad to the arrival of Capital Bikeshare, this multi-faceted neighborhood has kept Arlington connected, in space and time, by rail, bus, bike, and foot.

TERRAIN

Mostly easy, with some hills



Southern-Shreve Cemetery
Purchased by the Shreve family in 1791, this land was sold to St. Ann's Catholic Church and School in 1946. The 1832 family cemetery remains.

Bon Air Memorial Rose Garden
Dedicated in 1951 as a memorial to Arlington's WWII service members, today's one-acre garden contains more than 120 rose varieties.

Lacey Woods Park
This 14-acre park lies on land once owned by the Lacey family, whose property stretched across the street to their 1881 "Storybook House" and beyond.

Ballston Wetland Park
Wedged between the Custis Trail and I-66, this marshy oasis hosts an array of flora and fauna and also serves as a stormwater run-off facility.

Escuela Key Elementary School
A national pioneer in two-way immersion programs, this public school has taught students in English and Spanish since 1986.

Ballston Point
Ball's Tavern (1800), the Lacey Car Barn (1910), and Bob Peck Chevrolet (1964) are just a few of the businesses to set up shop at this historic crossroads over the decades.

Bluemont Junction Caboose
With exhibits and displays on railroad history, this red caboose marks the former hub of the W&OD Railroad, which carried passengers and freight from 1912-1968.

One-Stop Shopping
Whether you seek home cooking or international cuisine, a fun boutique or fitness center, grocery store or manicure, Bluemont's "village center" has it all.

Bluemont Park/Reevesland
This land was once part of Reevesland, Arlington's last dairy farm, which closed in 1955. Occupying 2.4 of the farm's original 168 acres, the Reeves family farmhouse and a milk barn remain, designated with a historic marker near Four Mile Run.
